Summary of Request

The Orientation Steering Committee has requested a budget increase of \$1.20 for a number of reasons, and we are dedicated to using the student activity fee in the best way possible to increase the well being of our students. In the past we requested a funding increase to bolster our transfer orientation, and since 2010, we have done just that. We have more than doubled the number of events since then, and compared to the 2008 funding cycle, when we had no transfer orientation, it is safe to say that the OSC has taken huge steps to help orient an important part of the Cornell community to campus with our increased funding. In the future, however, we hope to tackle a few other important issues on campus.

There are three main initiatives we are dedicated to spearheading in the next funding cycle. The first of which is continuing to bolster our transfer programming. We hosted a multitude of events this year in both January and August, and we hope that in the next cycle we can continue those efforts, if not make them even stronger. It is important that transfers are treated differently when they come to Cornell, as they have already attended college and know what orientation is. They need to get in touch with their own community and meet upperclassmen so that their Cornell experience can be the best it can be. With a little more funding we can make the transfer orientation an even better.

The second initiative is towards sustainability. The OSC did a trail run at this initiative this year to see how feasible it was, and we were able to have all of our events to be completely green with all compostable materials at minimal cost increase. The cost was slightly more however, hence our request for a budget increase. The bulk of the budget increase request falls under our pledge to eliminate plastic bottles of water during orientation and to encourage new students to "take back the tap." We paired up with the Cornell Store, the Office of Alumni Affairs, and Take Back the Tap to purchase reusable water bottles (Sigg, Nalgene, etc.) for all new students and orientation volunteers. This cost is something that is not sustainable for us, however, as it was made possible by a donation from alumni. Next year, and in successive years, this donation will not exist. For that reason we have asked for a budget increase to support Cornell's pledge to be carbon-neutral by 2050.

Lastly, we recognize there is an issue with student safety on campus. The OSC wants to help raise awareness for safe practices students should utilize, like not walking alone, ways to avoid sexual abuse, etc... Thus we asked for a budget increase so that we can implement a bigger event that will have a performer to talk about sexual safety, harassment, safety in general, etc... We are not sure what it will look like exactly yet, but we want to implement a program centered on being safe.

The OSC is committed to designing an orientation that is useful and helps all new students get acclimated, learn a few things about campus, and life in general before classes begin. We believe our programming is successful in many of these areas, but there is always room for improvement, as mentioned in our budget increase justifications. We also strongly believe in the initiative Cornell is pushing for in terms of sustainability. All in all we want orientation to be a model program on campus in all of the areas important to Cornell and new students, and while we are on our way to being that, these new requests will help us achieve even higher goals and give back in ways every student will appreciate throughout their college careers.

Introduction

Mission Statement

The goal of the Orientation Steering Committee is to foster a safe environment in which volunteers work with Cornell to successfully plan and execute a memorable, enjoyable, and extraordinary Orientation by fostering student leadership, encouraging teamwork, giving back to Cornell, and cultivating relationships between volunteers and new students. This work is done with the ultimate goal of welcoming new students and their families to campus, introducing them to the Cornell community, and encouraging students to increase their independence through the creation of new friendships and exploration of their new home throughout Orientation.

Organization Overview

The Orientation Steering Committee (OSC) is a 14-member committee which runs out of the Carol Tatkon Center and works under the auspices of the Office of New Student Programs in the Office of the Provost and the Office of the Dean of Students. The student-run committee is responsible for the planning and implementation of all university-wide orientation activities for new undergraduate students entering in both August and January as well as recruiting, selecting & training over 600 student volunteers. Orientation activities in August normally last five days, beginning on move-in day and ending the night before classes start. Activities in January last for six days immediately before classes begin. The purpose of these activities is to acquaint new undergraduate students—both transfers and first-years—with Cornell, its resources, history & values, and to promote interaction and unity among the new additions to this community. The four goals of Orientation are: building academic and personal self-confidence; building the community (cultural, residential, social, and recreational); developing intellectual skills and passions; and participating in community life.

Student Participation

Volunteers: Over 600 students volunteer in the Orientation Program each year (approximately 630 in August, 30 in

January) and serve as ambassadors for the rest of the Cornell Community. There are 4 different levels of volunteers: Orientation Steering Committee (OSC), Orientation Supervisors (OSs), Orientation Leaders (OLs) for both August and January, and members of the Move-In Crew (MICs).

Orientation Steering Committee: The committee (14 people each year) is responsible for recruiting, selecting, and training OSs, OLs, and MICs and for making programmatic decisions and coordinating events. The outgoing committee, through an application and interview process, chooses the new OSC from interested past Orientation volunteers in late September. The chair or co-chairs, who usually have served on the previous committee, guide the OSC; if there are no returning members, the chair or co-chairs are selected by the outgoing chairs and advisor among the incoming new members. The chair or co-chairs work closely with our advisor, Sarah H. Jones, the Assistant Dean of Students for New Student Programs, and other University officials to coordinate each step of the Orientation program & experience. Each member is individually responsible for specific events and duties (such as publicity, recruitment, or transfer transitions), while the entire group works together to coordinate additional efforts with college and university officials and members of the Ithaca community.

Orientation Supervisors: OSs (between 60-75 each year) work closely with the OSC and are selected in early spring. They are integral to the recruitment, selection, and training process for all Orientation Leaders. These dedicated individuals attend a brief training session in the spring and two days of intense training in the fall. The OSs then assist in leading the training for the Orientation Leaders for an additional two days. Each OS is assigned a group of OLs that they are responsible to train and supervise throughout the orientation period to ensure that they are providing their new students with the assistance they are seeking as well as to answer any questions or concerns the OLs may have regarding their role or responsibilities. They assist in the coordination of Move-In Day (and work all day) and are responsible for the supervision of the Orientation Leaders and Move-In Crew assigned to each building in addition to traffic. They also spend as much as ten hours meeting with their own small group of new students to share vital Cornell information, talk about decision-making, and assisting the new students with making friends and feeling connected to our community.

Orientation Leaders and January Orientation Leaders: OLs (or JOLs) participate in a two-day training session in the fall or January during which they receive multicultural and leadership training, develop listening and advising skills, and learn about resources of the University and how to help new students and parents cope with the changes they are facing upon entering Cornell. OLs assist new students with their belongings on Move-In day (each person works a four-hour shift), and work closely with the Cornell University Police and the Office of Transportation Services to ensure a smooth traffic flow and move-in process on north & west campuses in addition to Collegetown. They spend an average of 10 hours with their new students throughout orientation, volunteer to assist with events, and are available throughout the year to answer questions and address concerns that new students may continue to have. There are approximately 20-30 January Orientation Leaders each year and 500-600 Orientation Leaders.

Move-In Crew: The position of Welcome Volunteer was introduced in 1997 to give students who want to help with the Orientation program but who are not available throughout the orientation period an opportunity to participate. The Move-In Crew was introduced in the spring of 2007 to broaden the participation. In addition to extra volunteers through the MIC, students can participate through the Greek Councils (also known as the "Greek Movers & Shakers"), as an athlete, or through ROTC. These volunteers all work a four-hour shift on Move-In day and are most often assigned to high-traffic buildings to help new students move in. There are over 400 volunteers on the Move-In Crew each year.

New Students: This past August over 3,700 new students participated in the five-day-long Orientation program in August. This number includes both First-Year students (freshmen) and transfers. There are over 150 events offered

during August Orientation about half of which the OSC are intricately involved in. Due to the closure of the Transfer Center and the changes made to in transfer housing and transfer programming, the OSC has begun play a larger role in the orientation experience of Transfer students. This past August, we continued our efforts to expand and improve a separate Orientation for transfer students to address their unique needs and desires. Transfer Orientation continues to be extremely successful and offers a dozen events specifically for transfer students. The January Orientation program welcomes about 125-150 new transfer students each January, and the OSC is responsible for all aspects of the Transfer Orientation program offered in January, and works closely with the colleges on college-run events.

The Orientation Budget

The Orientation budget is made up of two components: administrative expenses and programming expenses. While the Student Activities Fee is our primary source of programming funds, the Dean of Students Office pays for the majority of our administrative expenses, including the publication and mailing of the Orientation Guide and schedules sent out to all new students & families, copying and supply costs, training associated expenses, telephone charges, CIT & other tech requirements, and the limited number of volunteer meals that are provided. Funding from the Dean of Students Office totaled nearly \$30,000 in FY 2009.

Programming: Each year the OSC sets out to improve the Orientation experience by building onto existing programs as well as creating new, innovative ones. Recent and future planning, as budgeted, encompasses an increasing emphasis on diversity/inclusion and faculty involvement in Orientation, and on Cornell as an intellectual community. Increased funding can not only make having more events possible, but can also enable us to enhance the quality of events and the overall Orientation experience. Particularly in the recent past, Orientation has had to compete with increasing numbers of upper-class students returning to Ithaca well before classes begin and therefore the "get-togethers" in Collegetown that result. We have found that despite our best efforts, we are being forced to compete with said gatherings during the late-night hours. We believe that every new student deserves the time and availability of a thorough and complete Orientation program and that the entire new entering group of students needs the time to explore all that Cornell is and has to offer during the orientation week, including the academic, cultural, informational, recreational, and social programming that is the responsibility of the Orientation Steering Committee.

The OSC also seeks assistance from the generosity of local businesses and other Cornell offices. These gifts can neither be anticipated nor expected. Because of this, we must provide a budget large enough to cover all of the expenses we expect to incur with the planning of events. Any gifts we do receive can be used to improve and expand the events, but cannot be relied upon.

Summary

We feel that Cornell's unique Orientation program is a valuable asset to the community, and that the OSC should continue to build upon Orientation in order to ensure an enjoyable experience for all. Orientation has an impact on EVERYONE and serves the needs of ALL Cornellians. No matter what age, what year, what time, what race, or what background, each and every new student has an opportunity through Orientation to meet other new students and get acquainted with this community. In addition, the program provides an incredible leadership and volunteer opportunity for over 600 student volunteers each year. Orientation creates a sense of community among existing students, faculty, and staff on this often overwhelmingly large campus. The OSC brings together various groups, organizations, and ideas that would not have otherwise come to work and play together in harmony. The OSC wants to expand its programming in the years to come to include a greater diversity in programming, increased

Constitution

I. NAME

The name of this body shall be the Orientation Steering Committee, hereafter referred to as OSC.

II. PURPOSE

This group will plan and run Orientation programs in January and August to introduce and acclimate new undergraduate students, both first-years and transfers, to Cornell University including recruiting, selecting & training over 800 volunteers annually.

III. FUNCTIONS

The function of the OSC shall be to:

- Section 1: Plan and run programs for new undergraduate students entering Cornell University in January and August.
- Section 2: Select and train January Orientation Leaders.
- Section 3: Select and train August Orientation Supervisors, Orientation Leaders, and members of the Move-in Crew

IV. MEMBERSHIP

- Section 1: Membership on the OSC is limited to full-time registered students of Cornell University
- Section 2: Each member will be a full OSC member, eligible to cast one vote in all OSC matters.
- Section 3: Members are selected by application and interviewed by the previous year's committee in September.
- Section 4: All members must have served as Orientation Volunteers. The chair or co-chairs must have served as orientation volunteers.
- Section 5: The Assistant Dean of Students for New Student Programs will serve as the Advisor to the OSC.

V. OFFICERS

Section 1: The officers of the OSC will consist of a chair or co-chairs.

Section 2: Chair or Co-chairs will be selected by the previous year's committee before the first meeting of the new committee.

Section 3: Chair or Co-chairs must be members of the OSC. Chair or Co-chairs of the outgoing OSC are ineligible to become chair or co-chairs of the incoming OSC.

VI. COMMITTEE SELECTION

Section 1: The OSC shall select new OSC members after the August Orientation program concludes.

Section 2. No incoming OSC member may be selected without having completed the application and interview process.

VII. MEETINGS

Section1: OSC will meet once a week throughout the academic year and for a pre-specified period of time immediately prior to orientation volunteer training.

Section 2: Additional meetings may be called by the Chair, Co-Chairs, or Advisor.

VIII. COMMITTEES

Section 1: The Committee may establish sub-committees, as it deems necessary

IX. NON DISCRIMINATION

Section 1: The OSC shall not discriminate on the basis of actual or perceived age, color, disability, ethnicity, gender, gender identity or expression, marital status, national origin, race, religion, sexual orientation, veteran status, or any combination of these factors when determining its membership and when determining the equal rights of all general members and executive board members, respectively, which shall include, but are not limited to, voting for, seeking, and holding positions within the organization.

X. AMENDMENTS

This Constitution may be amended at any regular meeting of the OSC by a two-thirds vote of the committee, provided that the amendment has been submitted in writing at the previous regular meeting, and that all OSC members have been notified. The advisor will serve as tie-breaking vote when necessary.

XI. APPROVAL

This constitution shall be effective upon a two-thirds vote of the OSC. The advisor will serve as tiebreaking vote when necessary.

The OSC Constitution is reviewed, updated, and approved in October of each year.
