AGENDA:

I. Presentation by Randy Lacey re: Cornell as climate leader, building standards as part of CAP, and Cornell's CAP relative to other schools

- CAP is based on carbon reduction goals, but sustainability is a much broader topic.
- Emissions inventory (buildings): electricity accounts for 27%, on-site combustion for 56%.
- CAPs vary school to school; there is no single model.
- Cornell CAP (buildings): green development + energy conservation.
- Green development goal: reduce energy through renovation and better use of what is built.
 - o Build less, build efficiently, and build smaller.
 - O Use existing space more efficiently and possibly revise space use standards (are they bigger than they need to be).
 - o Flex hours: sharing space and using space more efficiently.
 - O Stanford example: space use fees and space charge by department.
- Facilities Department is increasingly willing to impact people in order to make changes.
 - o Major hurdle: getting support from people for changes.
- Building energy use intensity:
 - o BTU/ft²/yr
 - o Baseline: 277k
 - o Target (near term, new buildings): 170k
- LEED -> ASHRAE: energy modeling
 - o Pass/fail tool with cost as common denominator, but never meant to be an energy modeling tool.
 - o Metric is cost, not BTUs; responsive to cheaper source of energy and not necessarily more efficient use.
- Cornell employs both building energy use intensity (BTU/ft²/yr) and ASHRAE as metrics.
- Energy conservation provides the biggest bang for the buck and the largest opportunities.
- Revolving loan fund: budget process still underway; no news on fund status until budget conclusion.
 - o Need for change in budget model.
 - o Harvard model: revolving loan fund separate from centralized budget and therefore more insulated from budget process and economic downturn.
 - Cornell: energy conservation fund centralized and therefore crashed when overarching funding and budget crashed.
 - o Separate revolving loan fund would have been better protected, but not yet created.

III. Addition of GPSA Members to UA Sustainability Committee
