## UA Resolution # 10 Investigating an Open Access Policy for Cornell

**Whereas,** it is in the mission of Cornell to "preserve and disseminate knowledge," [i] and the widest dissemination of knowledge benefits not only individual scholars and their discipline, but also the people of New York and the world,

Whereas, the Faculty Senate has passed resolutions urging "faculty to deposit preprint or postprint copies of articles in an open access repository" [ii] and supporting "alternatives to commercial venues for scholarly communication" [iii],

 Whereas, the Cornell University Library is actively engaged in encouraging open access to scholarly work by means of the Library's open-source publishing platform [iv] and a pilot fund [v] designated by the Library and the Office of the Provost to pay the fees to publish in open-access journals in the absence of other funding sources,

**Whereas,** the Library has established eCommons [vi] as a institutional repository for the University's digital works, maintains specialized repositories for the Schools of Law, ILR, and Hotel [vii], and owns and operates arXiv.org [viii], home to over 900,000 electronic pre-prints in physics, mathematics, computer science, quantitative biology, quantitative finance and statistics,

Whereas, many universities [ix], states [x], non-profit [xi] and federal funding agencies [xii], and corporations [xiii] have adopted open access publishing policies,

**Whereas,** the Library and the Library Board support increasing access to scholarly work at Cornell where feasible,

**Be it therefore resolved,** a committee will be established to investigate the feasibility of and campus support for implementing an open access policy (included in the resolution's appendix) wherein each faculty member grants to Cornell permission to make available her or his scholarly articles and to exercise the copyright in those articles,

**Resolved,** that this committee will at a minimum consist of one representative from each of the following: the University Assembly, the University Faculty Library Board, the University Library, the Faculty Senate, the Graduate and Professional Student Assembly, the Cornell Undergraduate Research Board, and the Office of the Vice Provost for Research. Any other member of the Cornell campus community (student, staff, faculty) may also be part of this committee,

**Resolved,** that this committee will consider items such as but not limited to: how an open access policy would benefit the Cornell community including its students, alumni, faculty/staff, and different departments, colleges, and disciplines; how an open access publishing policy can be

- 42 interfaced with data sharing plans (mandated for National Science Foundation funded work) 43 [xiv] for greater functionality of both the published work and the corresponding data; how as the land grant institution of New York, such a policy could allow Cornell to contribute to the 44 45 implementation of open access policies proposed [x] for research funded by New York State; 46 how the Cornell community would benefit from such a policy in light of proposed open access 47 policies from federal funding agencies; the short and long term savings and costs associated with 48 implementing an open access policy (e.g., personnel, hardware, journal subscription fees); how 49 to streamline the deposition of works into an open access repository owned and operated by 50 Cornell; how to implement such a policy such as by a phased rollout by college or department; 51 and how to streamline opt-out waivers from such a policy; and how to inform publishers of such 52 a policy, 53 54 **Resolved,** that this task force will report its findings to the University Assembly and Faculty 55 Senate no later than the November meeting of these bodies in the Fall 2014 semester. 56 57 Respectfully Submitted, 58 59 David Bunck 60 Executive Vice Chair, University Assembly 61
